Lighting of candles on the Advent wreath

One of the participants in tonight's service will light the Advent candles on behalf of us all. We invite everyone on the call to light their own candles wherever they are.

First reading: From the prophet Isaiah...

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God.
Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is expiated;
Indeed, she has received from the hand of God double for all her sins

A voice cries out:

In the desert prepare the way of the LORD!

Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God!


Every valley shall be filled in,

Gospel reading: From the gospel of Matthew...

Jesus said to his disciples: "What is your opinion? If someone has a hundred sheep and one of them goes astray, will the shepherd not leave the ninety-nine in the hills and go in search of the stray? And if they find it, amen, I say to you, they rejoice more over it than over the ninety-nine that did not stray. In just the same way, it is not the will of your God that one of these little ones be lost."

A reflection from this year's Advent-Christmas reflection booklet, by Creede Caldwell.

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. (Is 40:1)

Today Isaiah shouts to us of power and glory, the very fabric of the world shredded and re-stitched into God's new design. Scream it from the mountaintop! Proclaim the Justice and Constancy of our God! These words are an invigorating rallying cry to the movement of peace, crying out on behalf of the marginalized, the poor, the refugee, the excluded, the incarcerated, the oppressed.

And yet... this boisterous announcement sits in uncomfortable tension with the placid, pastoral parable Jesus gives us in the Gospel. An even more stark contrast will dawn on us in a few weeks when the God of the Universe is found wriggling in a feed trough. The Lamb reminds us that our God likes to play with the paradoxical. Power and glory arrive in the shape of one who stinks of manure. The trees of the forest rejoice in the one who will hang helplessly on a tree.

Whom have you written off? Which little ones have you let stray when you should have reached out in peace and friendship? They might smell, or even (gasp!) vote differently than you do; but if you are open, Jesus will kindly guide your hands in gestures of love.

Silent reflection

We invite you to quietly reflect on tonight's reading and the question: Whom have you written off? Which little ones have you let stray when you should have reached out in peace and friendship? After our prayer service is over, we encourage you—if you are with others—to share your answer to tonight's question. If you aren't with others but would like to share in a small group after tonight's

prayer, we'll send everyone who stays on the call into breakout rooms with a few other people to share for about 15 minutes immediately following the prayer service.

Release in us a brilliant blaze of compassion. Let the fires burn away all pettiness, greed, selfishness, and lust for security. Let embers of kindness fill the land. Whoever holds a debt, it will be forgiven. Whoever is rich will give half away: land returned to the peasant, prison doors thrown open, military budgets dissolved, a cup of water given in Jesus' name. Again. Again. And yet again. Amen.
