

2024 Lenten Ceasefire Campaign

Grassroots resources

We are calling for:

1. immediate, sustained bilateral ceasefire
2. demilitarization rather than sending weapons
3. release of all hostages and Palestinian prisoners held without due process
4. robust humanitarian assistance, U.S. funding UNRWA, the UN agency supporting Palestinian refugees
5. end the siege on Gaza and end the occupation of the Palestinian Territory
6. a political process to address root causes, for accountability of harm, and a lasting just peace

On [Ash Wednesday we offered a liturgy and ecumenical witness](#) at the White House with about 150 participants as well as 14 people risking arrest. On February 21, we welcomed a multi-faith pilgrimage to DC with a prayerful rally at the White House. The **week of February 25-March 2**, we invite each of us to engage in local grassroots actions as we ramp up the mobilization of this Lenten campaign. **Use this link to sign up for updates on the campaign.**

The **nonviolence logic** for this moment is that members of Congress are more responsive to constituent action; we want to build the bridges in our local communities for upcoming larger mobilizations.
