## Our keynote speakers and musical liturgists

#### July 25: Opening address with Maria Stephan

Maria Stephan is the Chief Organizer at the Horizons Project. She is an author and organizer whose work in academic, public service, and nonprofit sectors has focused on the role of nonviolent action and peacebuilding in advancing human rights, democracy, and sustainable peace in the US and globally. She serves on the advisory council of Pax Christi International's Catholic Nonviolence Institute, and was a participant in the Catholic Nonviolence Initiative gatherings in Rome in 2016 and 2019. She and Erica Chenoweth are co-authors of *Why Civil Resistance Works: The Strategic Logic of Nonviolent Conflict*. Their second book together, *The Role of External Support in Nonviolent Campaigns: Poisoned Chalice or Holy Grail?* was published in 2021.



#### July 26: Morning keynote with Jonathan Kuttab

Jonathan Kuttab is the executive director of Friends of Sabeel North America (FOSNA), co-founder of the Palestinian human rights group Al-Haq, and co-founder of Nonviolence International. He is a founding director of Just Peace Advocates Mouvement pour une Paix Juste, a Canadian based international law human rights not-for-profit organization and is president of the board of Holy Land Trust. An international human rights attorney, Jonathan practices in the US, Palestine and Israel. He was the head of the legal committee negotiating the Cairo Agreement of 1994 between Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO). He provides analysis regarding international law and human rights, understanding the facts on the ground, what options are possible beyond a two state solution, and Christian Zionism.



#### July 26: Evening program with Martha Inés Romero (video)

Based in Colombia, Martha Inés Romero serves as Secretary General of Pax Christi International. Martha Inés has a rich depth of experience working throughout the Americas and with global partners. She studied conflict transformation at the Kroc Institute for Peace and was a member of the Catholic Peacebuilding Network. She is both ecumenically and interfaith minded and works with partners across the civil society for dialogue and cooperation within communities across Latin America and the Caribbean. Her previous experience is in the aid sector, where she held international roles at Oxfam Great Britain and Catholic Relief Service.



#### Musical coordinator ValLimar Jansen and performer/liturgist Frank Jansen

ValLimar and Frank Jansen will join us during our conference weekend to lead prayer and praise, and to provide entertainment during Saturday evening's social. With more than 100 unique performances annually, ValLimar offers dynamic Scripture proclamation, reflection, music, costumed dramatic storytelling, prayer, and inspirational exhortation for schools, parishes, dioceses, and retreat centers throughout the US and Canada. Frank has served in parish ministry for more than 40 years, with a professional music career that spans over a course of almost 50 years. He has served as a liturgist, director of music, and/or principal pianist for countless liturgies, many including bishops and cardinals. Both Jansens have advanced degrees in music and performance.



#### **Musical guest Santiago Fernandez**



Santiago Fernández has been active in parish ministry for more than 30 years. He holds a bachelor's degree in music and is certified in both Pastoral Ministry and Liturgical Ministry, locally by the Archdiocese of Detroit and nationally by the USCCB's Commission on Certification and Accreditation. He served on the National Advisory Council to the USCCB from 2000 to 2004 and was Liturgy & Prayer coordinator for the First National Encuentro for Hispanic

Youth and Young Adult Ministry 2006. He is author of the bilingual book *Un Hermoso Intercambio Cultural/A Beautiful Cultural Exchange*, offering ideas, reflections and suggestions to open doors and broaden horizons within the multicultural integration of pastoral work in the United States. He currently serves as music and worship director at Church of the Holy Family, in Novi, Michigan.

## **Award recipients**

### Meta Peace Team, recipient of the 2025 Pax Christi USA Teacher of Peace award

Since 1978, Pax Christi USA has presented an outstanding peacemaker (individual or organization) with the Teacher of Peace award, our highest honor, to those who have shone a light for us on our journey toward solidarity and justice. Michigan-based **Meta Peace Team (MPT)** provides a civilian-based, community-focused nonviolent presence in areas of conflict. It educates and trains on the efficacy, vision, power, and practice of active nonviolence, particularly as it relates to nonviolent conflict intervention, and places peace teams both domestically and internationally where invited.



## Ralph McCloud, recipient of the Pax Christi USA Eileen Egan Peacemaker award

Established in 2007, the Eileen Egan Peacemaker award is given periodically to honor a group or individual who have given strong, extraordinary prophetic witness for peace in a time or situation of violence or injustice. **Ralph McCloud** served as executive director of the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), the anti-poverty program of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops, for 16 years before resigning in May 2024. McCloud, who currently serves as a Fellow with NETWORK, was chosen for this award for his unceasing efforts to lift up and center Catholic social teaching. (Photo by Jessica S. Zurcher)



### Joryán Hernández, recipient of the first Sr. Dianna Ortiz OSU Peacemaker award

This year, the Pax Christi USA national council voted to create a new award to celebrate young peacemakers. Named in honor of our beloved deputy director who died in 2021, the first Sr. Dianna Ortiz OSU Peacemaker award is presented to **Joryán Hernández**, a graduate student at the University of Notre Dame who has been a leader in the campus campaign in solidarity with Palestine and in calling for the university to divest from military contracts, particularly in light of the extraordinary suffering of the people of Gaza.

#### Building communities of hope - Walking with immigrants

#### Broken treaties, broken land; Restoring relationships, restoring the Earth

Using Pax Christi USA's "Pray-Study-Act" model, members of the Indigenous Solidarity Working Group will examine how the early United States adopted the Doctrine of Discovery — a legal framework that allowed European Christian nations to claim lands already inhabited by Indigenous peoples. This session will invite attendees to reflect, learn, and act — fostering solidarity, healing, and advocacy for the Indigenous peoples of Turtle Island and the Earth we share.

#### The humanitarian crisis in Darfur and Sudan and what can be done in response

Presenter: Dr. Nada Fadul, Professor at the University of Nebraska College of Medicine

Moderator: Dr. Gail Presby, Department Chair of Philosophy, University of Detroit Mercy; Pax Christi Michigan

The United Nations has described the war and humanitarian crisis in Sudan as the biggest humanitarian crisis ever recorded, and the African Union has declared it the worst humanitarian disaster in the world today. A conservative estimate suggests that between 145,000 and 150,000 civilians have been killed. At least 15 million people have been displaced, and 8.7 million are on the brink of famine. More than 18 million Sudanese face acute food insecurity. The economy has collapsed, millions are unemployed, and access to essential services has nearly vanished. More than 70 percent of Sudan's healthcare facilities are inoperable, leading to the spread of diseases and a lack of medical care for those who are injured and sick. This workshop will explore what is happening in Sudan and possible ways to resolve the crisis and what we can do in the United States.

When you feel like flipping tables: Faith-based advocacy for our times

Presenter: Catherine Gillette, NETWORK Advocates

In this training, we will engage what it means to be a faith-based advocate and help you hone your advocacy skills to meet the specific challenges of our times. We will examine which tactics are most (and least!) effective at influencing Members of Congress and what types of information elected officials most want to receive from you. We will explore how to build an effective campaign, data-driven approaches to messaging, and organizing best practices to help you expand your network. We will discuss the role of creativity in campaigns, as well as the importance of centering joy and community in our resistance.

This workshop will share about Pax Christi International's Catholic Nonviolence Initiative and the 2025 Catholic Nonviolence Days of Action (CNVDA), with an invitation to become involved in CNVDA at a local level in the US. In 2025, CNVDA will again join Campaign Nonviolence. Last year, as part of Campaign Nonviolence, more than 80,000 people participated in 5,329+ actions, events, and marches across the US and around the world.

#### Protect our kids: Youth, suicide, and guns

The United States' suicide problem is a gun problem. This workshop will combine prayer, background information on suicide by gun in the US, statistics, personal stories, related mental health issues, and discussion around solutions to this growing public health emergency in our country.

#### What Catholics can do to abolish nuclear weapons

This August marks the 80th anniversary of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Meanwhile, the nuclear powers have resumed the nuclear arms race, even as other existential threats like climate change and pandemics threaten the planet. Many US Americans feel they are powerless to effect needed change, but now is our time to stand up and demand change. This workshop provides a brief review of Catholic teaching on nuclear weapons and includes practical suggestions for Catholics to call for nuclear disarmament: from disinvestment from financial institutions and manufacturers involved in making nuclear weapons to advocacy with neighbors, bishops, and elected representatives. You will learn how you can build a more peaceful world.

#### Resisting a surveillance state: Racism, warfare, and economic injustice powered by AI without ethics





The use of artificial intelligence (AI) is proliferating. It has become a well-known marketing term as tech CEOs, high-profile engineers, and politicians have used prophecy as advocacy for decades, funneling untold wealth and power into the hands of the few. When powerful interests frame new applications of AI as inevitable, magical, and something to be adapted to without the possibility of rectification, great damage occurs. Government officials, law enforcement agencies, armies, landlords, and employers often hide when they use AI to make decisions about healthcare, employment, public benefits, housing, police investigations, and targeting in war. In this session, three expert speakers will expound upon how AI is already being used to fuel economic injustice, conflate security and surveillance with safety, destroy democratic government decision-making, and commit flagrant violations of human rights and laws of war, as we are witnessing in Palestine/Gaza today. The speaker presentations will be followed by a panel Q&A with the audience.
